

Tuning Up Your Start Menu - Windows 10



Windows 10, originally released in July, 2015, recently saw its second major update (V1607- Anniversary) in July, 2016. By now, most Windows 10 users have received that update. Originally, I had mixed feelings about the new hybrid “list and tiles” Start menu. However, I’ve gradually come to like it as a way to declutter my desktop and actually make it easier to find things. Here’s a screen of my desktop today:



The exact details don’t matter. As you can see, I still have a lot of icons on the desktop that I use to launch applications. Over a year of using Windows 10, I’ve steadily reduced the original number of icons by half to what you see in the screen shot. However, even now, when I’m working intensely and need to start an application while I have others running, it gets irritating. I have to minimize those other apps to uncover the desktop icons so I can double-click the one I need to launch the new app. Also, to launch from a desktop icon, I need to double-click it – something my stiff fingers no longer do well.

The Windows 10 V1607 Start Menu is the best incarnation yet and helps me with some of the above issues. You can open the start menu by clicking the flag icon at the bottom left of the screen or by pressing the Windows key. Following is a screen shot of my current Start menu:



I have stretched the Start menu out to allow four 3-column groups and have almost all my tiles sized to the medium, square size. In this layout, I don't need to scroll to find a particular tile. The tiles are grouped and labeled along functional lines, such as "Tom's Key Apps", Image Tools, "Movie and Video Tools", "Web Browsers and Tools" and others. The app tiles I use most are at the top left.

To launch an app, I just press the Windows key to pop open the Start menu and then click the tile of the app. The app starts up and the Start menu closes back up. I no longer need to uncover desktop icons and double click. Tiles are especially nice on hand-held touch screen devices.

Down the left side of the Start menu is the standard complete list of all installed programs. You can right click on any program in the list and choose "Pin to Start" to add a tile for that program to the array of tiles. You can then drag the tile to wherever you want it in either an existing group or a new group.

You can right click the tile to adjust its size to small, medium, wide or large. The wide and large sizes are useful for "modern" apps that animate their tiles with "live" content. News and Weather apps are examples. The medium tiles display the app's name and an icon.

You can adjust the width of the Start menu by opening it, positioning the mouse cursor over the right edge until the cursor turns to a double arrow, and then dragging to the right (to widen) or to the left (to narrow). Tile groups will automatically move to fit the new shape of the Start menu window. You can adjust the height of the Start menu by opening it, positioning the mouse cursor over the top edge until the cursor turns to a double arrow, and then dragging up or down. You can rename tile groups by clicking the space just above the group and then typing a name. You can move entire groups around by clicking and dragging the group's title space.

To remove a tile from the Start menu, right click it and select "Unpin from Start". That program will still be listed in the Start menu's left-side list of all installed programs. I got rid of quite a few of the default tiles for apps I never use.

To add a tile/icon to the Windows Taskbar, right click either the tile or the program name in the program list. In the pop-up menu, hover the mouse over the "More" option to get a second pop-up and choose "Pin to Taskbar". After the icon appears on the Taskbar, you can drag it left or right to where you want it to be permanently.

So, that's a quick summary of things you can do to make the Windows 10 Start menu work better for you!

Lessons in Rental Car Privacy

Have you used a GPS navigation unit or a hands-free phone Bluetooth connection in a rental vehicle? If so, did you remember to clear your information from the vehicle before you returned the car? It's not terribly

surprising that many people don't. Below are a couple of photos that I took of the video panel from a relatively new (6,500 miles) Toyota Corolla rental. The first shows a list of phones that previous drivers paired with the car's built-in Bluetooth feature. The second photo shows an example from one of the listed phones, giving the owner's phone number and the unique device address of the phone (partially blurred to protect the guilty). The car's system also

keeps the call history, and I have seen complete contact lists stored on some vehicles.

GPS navigation units, built-in and portable, also keep a history of locations searched for and visited. Very convenient, but probably not information you want to share with the next renter of the vehicle. Wouldn't it be entertaining to give a previous renter a call and have a chat with them about places they went and people they know? How would you like to get that call from a complete stranger?

If you use these features, take some time to clear the system memory when you return the vehicle. The rental company is not going to do this for you. In the case of the Toyota Corolla that I rented, I removed individual phones from the phone list, but also found and used a system reset option to remove all private data from the system (which also removed the preset radio settings).

Don't forget that this also applies to any other vehicle that you use, such as a personal vehicle you borrow, lend, trade-in or sell.

Lasers Replace Stickers on Fresh Food

Why stick a plastic label to food when you can print on it using a laser instead?



A lot of fresh food comes in its own natural packaging meaning there's no real need to encase them in plastic. I'm talking about produce such as potatoes, apples, oranges, bananas, avocados, and coconuts. And yet, you'll still find small plastic stickers attached to these foods advertising brand or variety. That practice could soon be a thing of the past, though, thanks to lasers.

Spanish company [Laserfood](#) wants to replace plastic and paper labels on food completely, and a laser-based system called "Natural Branding" is the answer. Laserfood's system works by naturally marking the produce without harming it. There is no impact on the food in any way, and it still lasts as long and taste the same.

Typically, a label consists of plastic or paper, glue, and inks. These are not easily recycled and cease being useful as soon as a product is purchased or consumed. By using Natural Branding instead, nothing is added to the product so it remains 100% recyclable.

To label the food, it is placed on a conveyor belt allowing it to pass through the Laserfood machine where it is exposed to light and then a contrast liquid. The light targets specific cells on the skin of the food to form a desired pattern by making them retract. A contrast liquid is then sprayed to make the retracted cells change color and the pattern becomes much more obvious.

The Laserfood machine can be programmed to print any number of details on to the food just like a printer. This could include a brand, dates, origin, or even images if desirable.

Laserfood managed to secure its first large-scale commercial customer earlier this month. Swedish retailer ICA is going to use Natural Branding on the sweet potatoes and avocados it sells. By doing so, over the course of a year the [Fresh Produce Journal reports](#) that ICA will require 725,000 fewer labels and in the process avoid using 220km of plastic.

Imagine applying the same technique to all fresh produce across all major food stores!

Chrome has a ton of hidden little tricks that you may not know about.

Browsers have evolved far beyond their original mission of providing one-way windows into the Internets. Indeed, as more services **migrate to the cloud**, browsers only reinforce their role as multi-function boxes of digital magic.

All the important Internet things are available in browser form—from **communication tools** to **productivity suites** to **disposable escapist entertainment**. It's almost like the browser has become an OS in and of itself. In fact, you could say that's exactly **where things are headed**.

While there is plenty of debate out there as to **which browser is best**, for my money it's the sleek, minimalist package known as **Google Chrome**. And the data shows that most users agree: According to **the latest numbers from W3Schools**, 73.7 percent of people are using Chrome, more than double the next highest, Firefox (15.5 percent), with IE (4.8 percent) and Safari (3.5 percent) far behind.

These numbers are based on visitors to W3's site, so they aren't a definitive representation of the greater population; **Net Applications** gave Chrome about 56.43 percent of the global browser market share in December, for example. But no matter what the final tally may be, Chrome is undeniably a popular browser, and if you're not using it, you should at least consider checking it out.

One of the reasons for Chrome's popularity is its clean, polished UI and its versatility. While Chrome's abilities multiply greatly when you consider the near-bottomless **library of extensions**, there's a bounty of stock functionality embedded all throughout Chrome's guts that you may not even know about.




